#### FROM THE HORSE'S MOUTH

The last premier race meeting of the season will be run at Taranaki this weekend featuring the \$65,000 Waikato Stud Opunake Cup over 1400 metres. I am Sam trained locally by Bryce Revell will carry topweight in the Opunake Cup. I Am Sam has won eight of his eleven races on heavy tracks.

Jumping action returns to Te Rapa this weekend with 54 acceptances in the four jumping events. The first of eleven races at Te Rapa will commence at 10.30am.

NZTR has increased funded prizemoney for all remaining mid-week race meetings this season.

So far this season 140 races have been abandoned, compared to last year's 101 races. The FY13 season had previously been the highest number of race abandonments in a decade.

The NZTR Board agreed that additional prizemoney should be provided to compensate stakeholders for the record number of meeting and race abandonments that have occurred this season.

The remaining mid-week races at Matamata, Avondale, Awapuni, Ashburton, Wingatui, Rotorua and Waverley will now all carry minimum stakes of:

\$25,000 for Open Handicaps;

\$17,500 for Rating 75 and Rating 85 races;

\$15,000 for Rating 65, 3YO and 2YO races;

\$10,000 for Maiden races.

NZTR wants to ensure that thoroughbred stakeholders are not disadvantaged by this record number of wet weather abandonments.

The additional stakes funding is due to a combination of prizemoney not being paid out (from abandoned race meetings) and NZTR maintaining its core operating expenses for the fourth consecutive year (at FY11 levels).

Standard prizemoney levels will return from 1 August 2014.

# STEM CELLS, STRANGLES & EQUINE METABOLIC SYNDROME: 2014 BAYER LECTURE SERIES 26 JULY - 3 AUGUST

This year's Bayer Lecture Series presents three New Zealand-based Researchers making presentations on the outcomes arising from research projects that received NZ Equine Research Foundation funding.

#### 1. Dr Lee Morris

- Stem cells: how to turn fat into bone! This seminar will define "What are stem cells" and describe how stem cells are recovered from one type of tissue and transformed into different tissue types for healing injuries in the horse.
- Stem cells: new treatments for lameness on the horizon snake oil or science?

This seminar will discuss the clinical application of stem cell therapies in horses, what has been done and what the future holds for this treatment option.

Dr Morris was trained as a veterinarian in Australia and performed her post graduate studies in Canada and the UK. She is now the director of EquiBreed NZ Ltd and specialises in veterinary treatment of equine infertility, frozen semen technologies and stem cell therapies. Lee is passionate about bridging the gap between the ivory towers of science and the clinical application of new technologies for the horse.

## 2. Dr Ray Cursons

- What is strangles? Aspects of the disease important in transmission and severity.
- Getting to Grips with Strangles: the discovery of the strains specific to NZ applying this to better management and diagnosis.
- Vaccination: comparison of responses after natural infection or following vaccination.
- New Research: importance of other Streptococci in respiratory and reproductive tracts of horses.

Ray Cursons is currently a senior lecturer in molecular genetics in the Science Faculty of the University of Waikato. Ray's main interest is in disease caused by genetic mutation or disease caused by micro-organisms. He and his student, Olivia Patty, were recently invited to present their findings at the Havemeyer Workshop in Kentucky and to speak on their NZERF funded research on strangles.

# 3. Dr Michelle Logan

Research into Equine Metabolic Syndrome. Is your horse at risk, how is it diagnosed, and how to treat and manage it.

Michelle Logan is a graduate of the University of Cambridge, UK and has practised as a veterinarian in the North and South Island as well as two and a half years at the Massey University Teaching Hospital. She is now based in Southland.

## CANTERBURY JOCKEY CLUB GRAND NATIONAL RACING CARNIVAL

The three day Canterbury Jockey Club Grand National Racing Carnival starts on Saturday 2 August with the running of the EstarOnline 117<sup>th</sup> Winter Cup. Wednesday, 6 August features the Hospitality New Zealand Canterbury 125<sup>th</sup> Grand National hurdles and the meeting culminates with the Racecourse Hotel 139<sup>th</sup> Grand National Steeplechase on Saturday 9 August 2014. Eight of the 29 races over 'The National Meeting' are over obstacles.

With the assistance of the New Zealand Racing Board Riccarton Park Racecourse will be well positioned for the re-launch of TAB TV and the Trackside Channel in to Trackside 1 and Trackside 2 as from 1 August 2014. Everywhere on the race course where there was previously a television displaying the TAB TV Channel there will be two televisions to enable both Trackside 1 and Trackside 2 to be played to ensure punters don't missing a thing. #### **Turnover Summary Notes**

Total NZ thoroughbred turnover is down 1.36% year to date.

With 121 less races than run over the same period last season, turnover per race has actually increased, up 2.95%.

Total starts made by thoroughbreds in NZ are down 1,292, 4.3% less.

Average field size is 10.43 in FY14, slightly lower than FY13 year to date.

The number of races with less than 8 starters is now 40 higher than a season ago.

The decline in NZ thoroughbred totalisator turnover (down 5.0%) has been partly offset by an increase in FOB turnover (up 12.4%).

\$NZ export turnover per race to 22 June is down (12.1%). The variance in the \$NZ/\$A exchange rate is responsible for a large proportion of this decline. The remainder, as well as the absence of any growth, appears to have resulted from the loss of coverage on Sky 1 in Australia for midweek races run after 2pm.
