Cheltenham Festival Dream Series 2012

The NZ Champion Series is a points-based competition to be contested during the 2012 Jump racing season.

The connections of the horse that wins the Series will be offered the opportunity to compete at the Cheltenham Festival in England in March 2013. Assistance will also be offered with logistics, stabling and access to training facilities in the UK.

The purpose of the series is to identify the most outstanding and consistent jump racing horse in the country. The series is open to both hurdlers and steeplechasers and equal opportunities exist for both divisions. The principal prize will be the payment of £6000 (approximately \$NZ12,000) towards transport costs and the guarantee of a start in a Championship race at the Festival.

A trophy will also be presented by NZ Jumps Inc to the winning horse, regardless of whether or not the opportunity to travel to Cheltenham is accepted.

The schedule includes 24 individual races. Points are tiered in relation to the grade of the event. The schedule of events runs from 8 May to 16 October. The overall winner will simply be the horse with the most points.

The Cheltenham Festival is a four day race meeting with a programme of 27 races.

2012 Bayer Lecture Series

"Understanding Horse Behaviour"

Dr Sue McDonnell is the key-note speaker for this year's Bayer Lecture Series.

Dr McDonnell completed a post doctoral study in clinical veterinary reproduction at the University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Centre in 1987 and became board certified in Applied Animal Behaviour in 1991. She is the founding head of the Equine Behaviour Program at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Medicine, where her work includes clinical, research, and teaching activities focused on horse behaviour.

Dr McDonnell's first talk will be "Horse Cognition 101: The science of how horses learn and why it's important to horse owners, handlers, trainers and veterinarians."

Horses follow the general laws of learning for all animals and humans that are well described in the scientific literature. This talk will focus on how to most effectively teach your horse to stand patiently when necessary, lift feet when asked, load for transport, happily accept veterinary treatments, come when called, or have otherwise generally good ground manners, using all-positive reinforcement techniques.

The second talk is titled "Behaviour problems can be physical, psychological or both: why this is important for horse owners, handlers, trainers and veterinarians to appreciate."

When it comes to figuring out behavioural changes in horses, it can often be quite challenging to work out whether the underlying cause is physical, psychological or a combination of both, and if a combination of both, which came first. While problems are often assumed to be behavioural, in many cases the underlying cause is physical but difficult to identify.

This talk will feature a number of clinical behaviour cases presented to the New Bolton Centre for evaluation, where a team of behaviour and medical specialists were able to successfully diagnose the underlying cause. Examples will include difficulty with transport, collapsing in the cross-ties while being saddled, head tossing under saddle, panic-like episodes, aggression toward people, and self-mutilation. The method of evaluation and treatment for each case will be described in detail.

NZTR Handicapping Review - May 2012

In early 2011 NZTR instituted a detailed Review of its Handicapping policies and procedures. The Review identified a number of key changes that were formally adopted by the NZTR Board and implemented on 14 November 2011. The NZTR Board made a commitment to monitor the changes including six monthly reviews.

NZTR now invites submissions and recommendations from industry participants on any aspect of the Review outcomes and the changes that were introduced in November.

NZTR will also be consulting with various sector groups in May including the three Regional Programming Committees, Racing Clubs, NZ Trainers Association, NZ Thoroughbred Breeders Association, NZ Jockeys Association, NZ Racehorse Owners Federation and the New Zealand Racing Board.

As part of your response please provide any supporting statistics, comments or examples of your viewpoint. If you wish, you might also like to provide a response to the following questions:

- Has the current NZTR Programming and handicapping system worked for you, and why?
- What parts of the current system do not work, and why?
- What would you change, and why?

Amongst the handicapping/rating issues that have been already been identified are weight penalties for horses racing out of their class, horses being re-rated out of their class for placings and the order of entry into Open Group One races for 3YO's.
