Courtesy Ford Manawatu Sires Produce day is Awapuni Racecourse's biggest raceday. The premier meeting has a minimum stake of \$30,000 and features the \$200,000 Group One Courtesy Ford Manawatu Sires Produce Stakes for two year olds. The feature event includes Selfie, Rocanto, Nahema and Strata Lady.

The \$70,000 Group Three Higgins Manawatu Classic will highlight an exceptional crop of three year olds. Many of the runners will be using the race as a stepping stone to a potential Australian campaign. Francis Drake, Werther and Aotearower are progressive types looking to validate themselves at black type level, while Charmont, Dee I Cee and Exquisite Jewel are already proven. The race has produced Time Keeper and Survived as subsequent Group One winners.

The \$100,000 Ezibuy Awapuni Gold Cup includes three Group One winners and key progressive types. Nashville and Iamishwara look to get back their winning ways, however King Krovanh appears to be a headlining type who will test. The five year old Fastnet Rock gelding has registered wins over Maygrove and a close second to subsequent Group One winner Sahkee's Soldier. The form alone highlights his class and carrying 55kg surely places him in a top tier finish. The race is at 5.17pm.

RACING SAFETY DEVELOPMENT FUND (RSDF) APPLICATIONS CLOSE ON 31 MARCH

As previously noted, The Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) is introducing an new online process to facilitate applications to the RSDF. All details on this and a connection to the 'RealMe' online system are available at the above address.

CHANGES TO RULE 707 - BETTING BY RIDERS

Following consultation on proposed changes to Rule 707 with industry stakeholders, the Racing Integrity Unit, Judicial Control Authority and the Racing Board, further changes have been made to Rule 707 - Betting by Riders.

Riders are no longer permitted to bet on any race under the Rules of Racing. Previously Riders were not permitted to bet on any race run on a day on which a Rider was riding in a race.

A Rider may bet (other than on a race under the Rules of Racing) provided the Rider places the bet through his or her betting account with an Authorised Wagering Operator (as defined in the Rules) using his or her mobile phone or any other electronic communication device including a smartphone, laptop, personal computer, tablet, pager or similar device. Amateur Riders are permitted to bet on races other than any race in which he or she is riding.

These changes bring New Zealand into closer alignment with the Rules in Australia and other major racing jurisdictions.

Meeting details:

- Whangarei RC Wednesday meeting equivalent was run by Counties RC at Pukekohe last season.
- Waipukurau JC Friday meeting ran 8 races in FY15; the equivalent meeting was abandoned after 3 races in FY14 due to an inconsistent racing
- -Canterbury Racing Saturday meeting ran 10 races this season, 9 last season.

Turnover summary notes:

- -Total NZ thoroughbred turnover is up 2.0% year to date.
 -8 less meetings and 34 less races have been run than to the same date last season.
- -Turnover per race is up 3.9%.
- -Total starts made by thoroughbreds in NZ are down 370, 1.9% less. -Average field size is 10.37 in FY15, down from 10.38 (0.1%) in FY14
- -The number of races with less than 8 starters is now the same as the season prior (314).
- -The decline in NZ thoroughbred totalisator turnover (down 5.0%) has been offset by an increase in FOB turnover (up 24.3%).
- -Export turnover (\$NZ) is up 8.8% per race to 28 February.

Note: Turnovers are provided by the NZRB from various reports. On-course is totalisator turnover on the meeting and on intertrack meetings, plus FOB racing turnover on the meeting only (FOB intertrack is not provided from these reports at present). On-course self service turnover is also not currently included. Total NZRB racing turnover is NZ thoroughbred, harness, greyhound plus all imported thoroughbred, harness and greyhound turnover; combined with sports this provides the total NZRB turnover. NZ thoroughbred export turnovers are stated in \$NZ, generally up to a week or two behind other turnover numbers.
